
Problems and Causes

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
1. DISILLUSIONED YOUTH


A. CAUSES

Discriminated against, separated from their fellow Palestinians by the wall, Palestinian youth in Jerusalem have for many years fallen between the cracks.









2. Challenges in Access to Emergency Services

- Israeli emergency services are required by law to wait for police escort to enter some Palestinian neighborhoods in EJ
- The Palestinian Red Crescent which has only 5 ambulances, none of which has an ICU unit – must obtain prior authorization from Israeli forces before intervening at any site in EJ
- During times of tensions, entire Palestinian neighborhoods might be sealed off by police

PMRS INTERVENTIONS

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Increasing Community Emergency Preparedness and Empowering Youth

1. BUILDING UP EMERGENCY PREPAREDNESS IN VULNERABLE COMMUNITIES

- PMRS trains teams of first responders from 14 community in vulnerable locations to be able to intervene until emergency services can reach the site.
- PMRS set up first aid stations in 8 neighborhoods across the city for volunteers to use
- PMRS organizes basic first aid and evacuation training in 54 local schools for faculty and students

2. MOBILIZING YOUTH TO PROTECT THEM

- Around 1500 young Palestinian men and women trained in first aid & emergency preparedness in Jerusalem over the past 10 years
- Trained youth report a newfound purpose and feeling of usefulness at being able to help their communities, as well as a renewed sense of identity & a sense of pride
- First aid serves as a key to attract youth to the organization; other trainings are offered to increase their participation in the community & their civic engagement: advocacy, campaigning, communication, gender issues, environmental issues...

3. Empowered Youth Improve Their Communities' Health & Wellbeing

• PMRS volunteers implement several small initiatives each year.

- In 2019, for instance, they:
 - rehabilitated gardens, planted herbs & fruit trees in 2 schools & 1 community center
 - applied fresh coats of paint in 3 schools
 - organized visits to orphanages and retirement homes
 - distributed cloth bags in bakeries and shops around the city to raise awareness about the impact of plastic
 - volunteered as youth leaders in PMRS's summer camp
 - organized a "bring your own book & come" at their local library for local children
 - ... and many more activities
