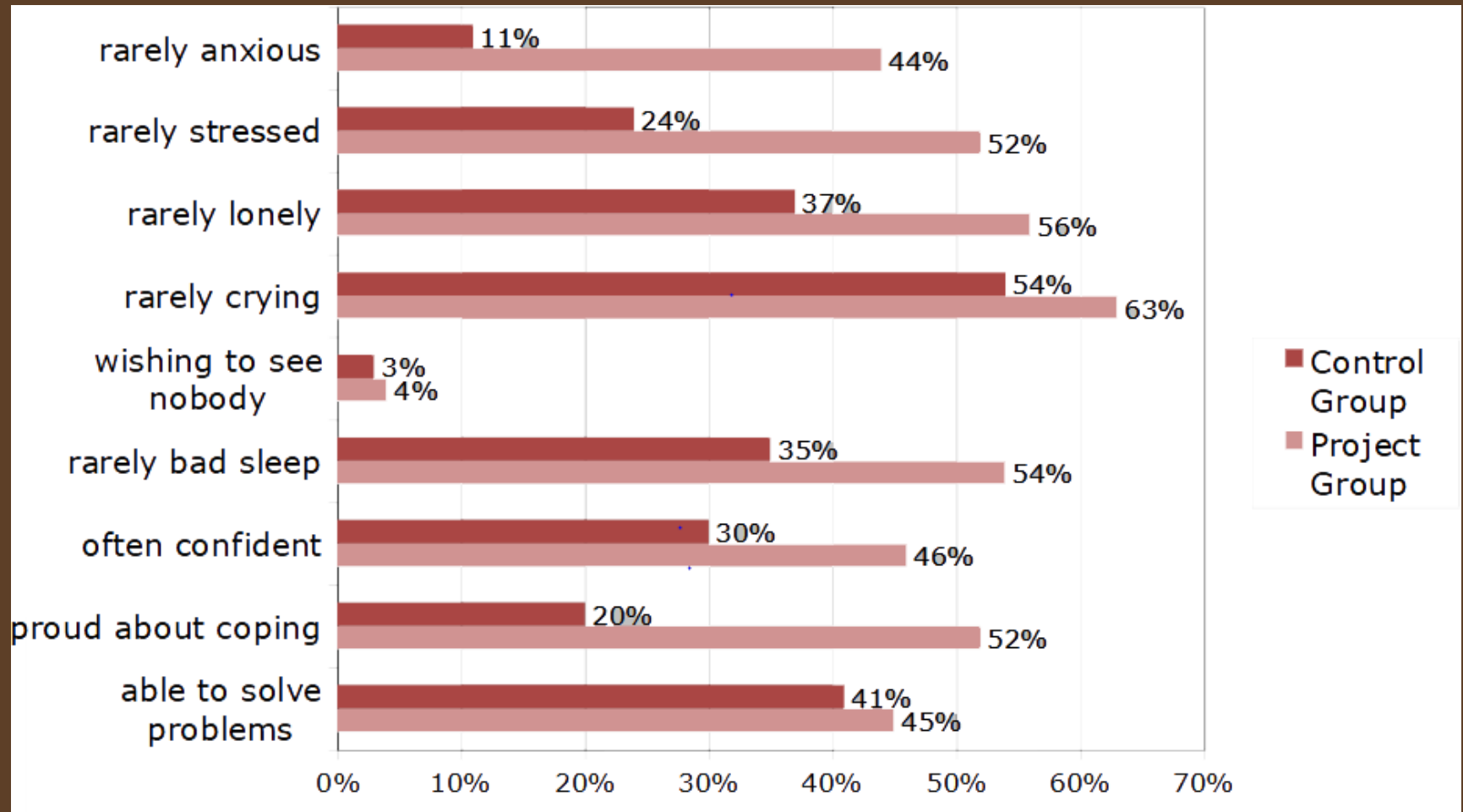
Impact of pensions

Studies carried out in 2008 and 2014 show that:

- cash transfers almost double the household income
- significantly more food and more varied nutrition, more household essentials
- better protection against crisis
- reciprocity instead of begging
- stabilized health
- more spending on investments and household assets
- clear indications of better social inclusion and support of local economy

- For children it also meant:
 - improved school access
 - more time to play
