

Objectives

Young people aged 18-24 years in higher and tertiary education institutions realize positive health, education and gender equality outcomes through sustained reductions in:

- new HIV infections
- unintended pregnancy
- gender-based violence






Background – SRHR needs in HTEIs

In Zambia and Zimbabwe, tertiary institutions are home to over 582'000 young adults.

Many young people still enter their twenties without adequate knowledge, placing them at an elevated risk for unintended pregnancies, sexual abuse and other negative outcomes.

A lot of tertiary institutions do not offer a comprehensive health approach that encompasses the SRHR needs of students and only a few have fully functional and equipped clinics.



SRHR needs in HTEIs

- 1 in 4 young women aged 20-24 years in sub-Saharan Africa have been physically, sexually or psychologically abused by a partner
- More than 40% of young women and 30% of young men in ESA agree that a husband is justified in hitting or beating his wife
- Nearly 4000 adolescent girls and women aged 15-24 in ESA become infected with HIV every week
- Only 41.9% of males and 44.3% of females aged 15-24 years are able to identify ways of preventing sexual transmission of HIV
- Rates of unintended pregnancies among students are unacceptably high (75% in Zambia and 63% in Zimbabwe)
- Students represent a large population and are the leaders of tomorrow



Background – O3 Programme

- The project (O3+) expands the reach of UNESCO's existing Our Rights, Our Lives, Our Future (O3) Programme.
- Leadership of UNESCO
- Other stakeholders: other UN organisations, Ministries of Higher Education, Campus Health Facilities, Civil Society Organisations, SADC Secretariat, Tertiary institutions' communities.

Reach 108,254 students in-person or online with accurate, rights-based CSE through the formal CSE module



Train 161 healthcare providers on youth-friendly SRH service provision



Train 4,200 peer educators on youthfriendly SRH services provision


Outcome 1: Institutional Strengthening

Institutionalize CSE:

- Facilitate the development and/or adaptation of a CSE curriculum framework to become a compulsory component for all students across all faculties
- Train college and university lecturers in CSE to enhance curriculum-based delivery to students
- Support the distribution of standard resource package and induction events

Address GBV:

- Review and/or develop institutional policies on student welfare including policies on GBV and sexual harassment
- Enhance policy implementation by raising awareness among students on the existence of policies








Development of mobile applications to ensure students have adequate information on SRHR, professional counselling as well as a helpline for emergency situations.


The development process placed **students at the center**. Students participated in the mobile app design, name, selection of features and development of content.



Outcome 2: Student health and well-being

Increase SRHR service uptake:

- **Train healthcare workers** to provide youth friendly services.
- Renovate health facilities to offer a more appealing and youth-friendly environment
- Train peer educators to disseminate CSE and SRHR information to students
- Establish mobile health services to provide family planning, STI screening, HIV self-test on campus
- Engage dialogues with authorities and advocate to ensure reliable supply of key SRH commodities
- **Establish gender desks** to strengthen GBV case management and linkages with support services



Outcome 3: Safe and inclusive campus environments

Raise awareness on GBV and EUP, strengthen institutional complaint pathways:

- Train students, academic staff, support staff, campus security staff etc. on identifying, reporting and responding to GBV
- Conduct campaigns on GBV and SRH during relevant international days using innovative approaches
- Support students to create podcasts, radio shows and social media messages
- Empower O3 ambassadors to disseminate messages on GBV, EUP and SRHR
- Review and strengthen institutional complaint pathways and whistle-blower protection on sexual harassment and GBV




Objective 4: Evidence-building and knowledge-sharing

Strengthen Evidence:

- Conduct operations research studies on HIV/STI and GBV burden in HTEIs and the overall context for SRHRrelated activity and service utilization
- Facilitate policy dialogue between students, policy makers, college authorities on key issues identified in the research studies
- Foster a culture of knowledge sharing between institutions of higher learning

Enhance Data Management System:


 Support institutions to develop a functional information system (databases, health records, surveys, monitoring) for O3 PLUS disaggregated statistics reporting



By 2050, the number of young people aged 10 to 24 living in sub-Saharan Africa will be 605 million (UNFPA 2012)

The issues affecting the daily lives, health, and social statuses of adolescents are varied and complex, requiring a close scrutiny of historical legacies, social and cultural contexts, and institutional frameworks.

If young people will drive the development of the country in the next two decades, then concerted effort to invest in their education and health is critical to ensure that these young people become professionals in good health (Joshi 2012; UNESCO 2013; UNFPA 2014; Lancet 2012).
