Group A:

What are key instruments for successful community health programs in fragile contexts?

We will explore the reasons why these mechanisms are (or are not) successful as well as how the NGOs measure their results and what they put in place to overcome the challenges they faced.

Group C:

Adapting modalities to work in fragile contexts- an institutional perspective

Fragility is a key current concern for emergency relief work and development cooperation alike. Many agencies accept that engaging in fragile situations comes with specific risks and challenges. These include the sustainability of interventions, threats to the security of staff and partners, and high program costs compared to work in more stable circumstances. There are, however, agencies that assert it is possible to engage in such contexts, especially when long term partnerships exist. Indeed, if current trends continue, development actors in general will face little choice but to work in fragile contexts in the future – requiring them to rethink and adapt their working modalities

- What are the principles for engagement in fragile contexts (go/no-go decision)?
- How to leverage the necessary capacity to respond effectively if the security situation deteriorates?
- How to adapt ways of working to accommodate fast-changing realities (project-cycle-management)?
